Brooklyn's Newest Citizens Welcomed At Wyckoff Farmhouse

United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) held a special naturalization ceremony for 49 local residents at the Wyckoff House Museum, 5816 Clarendon Road, on June 15th. United States Magistrate Vera M. Scanlon of the U.S. District Court, Eastern District of New York, administered the Oath of Allegiance to America's newest citizens.

USCIS New York District Acting Director John E. Thompson presided over the ceremony. Allegra Durante performed the National Anthem and Museum Director of the Wyckoff House Museum Melissa Branfman welcomed the new citizens of
